



IFORS' Operational Research Hall of Fame

In 2003, IFORS created the Operational Research Hall of Fame. The IFORS official journal, *International Transactions in Operational Research* (ITOR), has published a brief biography of a newly inducted member of the OR Hall of Fame in each issue for the last four years. This has given an opportunity to celebrate significant contributions made to OR. The credit for proposing this celebratory project goes to ITOR editorial board member and former IFORS President, Heiner Muller-Merbach.

The inductees into the Hall of Fame were chosen by votes from a panel. Fifty individuals plus all presidents of IFORS member societies were invited to be members of this selection panel. The 50 individuals consisted of the Administrative Committee of IFORS, the editors and members of the editorial board of ITOR, and seven individuals specially chosen to provide historical perspective and geographical balance.

Members of the panel were initially asked to propose 11 names for inclusion in the Hall of Fame. They were given a list of some 40 potential inductees, but it was emphasised that the list could be ignored, or looked at before or after making a selection. The choice was not restricted to those on the list. Over 90 individuals were deemed worthy of inclusion in the Hall of Fame by at least one member of the panel. By this process the first 11 inductees were determined, and their citations appeared during 2003 and 2004. In 2004 the selection panel were asked to choose the next 12 inductees in the light of those already chosen.

The full list of those inducted into the Hall of Fame is given in Table 1. It is presented in order of the number of votes cast, rather than publication date. I am very grateful to all those who have written a citation. Scrutiny of the list will make it obvious that I am particularly indebted to three individuals, Saul Gass, Jonathan Rosenhead and Maurice Kirby, who have contributed more than one citation. Furthermore, Saul Gass has been extremely helpful in suggesting possible citation writers. He made my task far less onerous than it might have been. It can also be seen that I was tougher with the writers of the early citations in terms of length. It should not be inferred that the significance of the inductee is proportional to the length of the citation. An analysis of those inducted shows that membership in the Hall of Fame is dominated, not surprisingly, by Americans. Only four spent their working life outside the United States, and they were all Europeans, though the remarkable story of Egon Balas started in Romania. It will also not be a surprise, though for many a disappointment, that none of those chosen are women.

Chronologically the first member is Erlang, who died in 1929, two decades before the birth of OR. But, despite some concern when the project was originally proposed that those inducted would be dominated by the early pioneers, it is interesting to notice that a significant proportion of the members (nine out of the 23) are alive. George Dantzig died on May 13, 2005, two years after his citation was published. West Churchman died in 2004 as his citation was in preparation.
